Advisory Board Members

Stanley E. Althof, PhD, is Voluntary Professor of Psychology at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine and Professor of Psychology in the Department of Urology at Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland, Ohio. He recently moved his clinical practice to West Palm Beach, Florida where he opened the Center for Marital and Sexual Health of South Florida. Dr. Althof is on the Consulting Staff of Good Samaritan Hospital in West Palm Beach. He and his two former partners were the 2005 recipients of the prestigious Masters and Johnson Lifetime Achievement Award.

In addition to teaching and clinical practice, Dr. Althof also consults with several major pharmaceutical companies to develop and validate outcome measures, design research methodologies, and conduct clinical trials on a variety of new treatment options for male and female sexual problems.

Dr. Althof is Past-President of the International Society for the Study of Women's Sexual Health (ISSWSH), Past-President of the Society for Sex Therapy and Research (SSTAR) and the Tri-State Group Psychotherapy Society. He serves on the editorial boards of the Journal of Sex and Marital Therapy, Menopause and the International Journal of Impotence Research and is an ad hoc reviewer for several other journals. He is the Associate Editor of two books- Handbook of Clinical Sexuality for Mental Health Professionals and Male and Female Sexual Dysfunction.

As a skilled clinician and scientist, Dr. Althof's research focuses on the psychosocial aspects of sexual dysfunction and their impact on men, women, and couples. He has been instrumental in the development of sex therapy as a sub-specialty. Dr. Althof is the author of many original publications and has contributed numerous chapters to leading textbooks in psychiatry, urology, and sex therapy. He is a highly sought after lecturer and travels extensively both internationally and within the United States to present his research findings.

Dr. Althof received his Ph.D. in clinical psychology from Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, Oklahoma. He completed an internship in clinical psychology at University Hospitals of Cleveland, which was followed by additional postgraduate work at the Menninger Foundation in Topeka, Kansas. He continues to maintain his Professorship and staff affiliation at Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine and University Hospitals of Cleveland.

Sallie Foley, LMSW, is the director of the Michigan Sexual Health Certificate Program at the University of Michigan. In addition, she is the director of the University of Michigan Health

Systems, Department of Social Work, CENTER FOR SEXUAL HEALTH, and has been an adjunct faculty member at the University of Michigan School of Social Work since 1981.

Ms. Foley has written chapters and articles about the treatment of sexual difficulties and co-authored the publicly acclaimed Sex Matters for Women: A complete guide to taking care of your sexual self (Guilford, 2002). Her most recent book, Modern Love: A no-nonsense guide to a life of passion (Sterling, 2006), was based on her column “Modern Love” in the nationally circulated AARP, The Magazine. Her current research projects include sexual health concerns and chronic illness.

Sallie Foley is an AASECT certified sexuality educator, supervisor, and Diplomate of sex therapy.

Edward Goldman, JD, was head of the Health Systems Legal Office at the University of Michigan 1978 to 2009. March, 2004 he was appointed Associate Vice President and Deputy General Counsel for the University. January 2009 he left the legal office to become a full time faculty member in the University of Michigan Medical School Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology working in the Center for Reproductive Rights. He is also a Professor at the University Of Michigan School Of Public Health where he teaches courses in health law and the legal and ethical aspects of research. Mr. Goldman enjoys a diverse career combining law, teaching, writing, and community service.

At the start of his career he practiced labor law then worked in the City Attorney’s Office for Ann Arbor, taught at the University of Michigan Law School and was a partner in a private civil and trial practice firm.

Mr. Goldman has written on a number of topics in the health care field. His writing covers such important areas as refusing treatment, informed consent for breast cancer therapy, consenting to blood transfusion, Jehovah Witnesses, medico-legal issues in pulmonary medicine, the law of emergency care in neonatal emergencies and privacy issues. He has also published in the areas of genetics, wrongful birth, fetal versus maternal rights, medical education, and non-custodial parents’ rights in their children’s health care.

A graduate of both the University of Michigan and its law school, Mr. Goldman is a former president of the Michigan Society of Hospital Attorneys. In 1980, the society recognized his contributions by giving him its “First Annual Award for Outstanding Contributions to Health Law Literature.”

Mr. Goldman has served on Michigan State Bar Committees on Medical-Legal Issues and Rights of the Mentally Disabled. Since 1978 he has been a lecturer for a variety of state and national

programs. He has been a member of the Planning Committee as well as a speaker for the American Health Lawyers Association annual Academic Medical Centers conference. He also serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Critical Care and the Advisory Board for BNA's Medical Research Law & Policy Report.

Since 1996, he has been a visiting professor at Indiana University's Poynter Center where he teaches about the ethics of research. From 1999 until 2005, he was an instructor in the University of Wisconsin's annual research conference.

In 1993, Mr. Goldman was a member of the White House legal audit task force on health care reform. This position gave him the opportunity to work on the Clinton health reform plan.

In 1999, he was named chair of the Governor's Commission on Genetic Privacy and Progress. That Commission submitted a report that served as the basis for Michigan legislation. The report was highlighted as a model for State legislation.

In July, 2001, Mr. Goldman was appointed to the State of Michigan Certificate of Need Commission. He was appointed to a second term April, 2004 and was elected vice chair of the Commission in March, 2005. He was appointed to a third term in 2007 and became Chair in 2008. He also assists the State by serving on its Management and Prevention of Hepatitis C Commission (2008-2009).

From 2001 through 2004, Goldman served as the public policy expert for the American College of Medical Genetics Task Force on Newborn Screening. The Task Force created a model newborn screening panel. In July, 2002, he was named by the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke to a national task force on choosing the standard of care for stroke treatment. That appointment resulted in a consensus development conference and report.

In June, 2002, he received the W. Quinn Jordan award from the American Association of Blood Banks for his contributions to the law of transfusion medicine. From April, 2003 through April, 2008, Goldman served on the American Board of Electro Diagnostic Medicine. In June, 2004 he received the American Health Lawyers Association In-House Counsel National Golden Ferret Award for excellence in health care law story-telling, and in March, 2006, he received the Friend of Nursing award from the Sigma Theta Tau Honor Society of Nursing.

He is a nationally known speaker on a wide variety of legal and ethical health care topics. In his spare time he does community service for local charities, practices yoga, cooks and avoids practicing the classical guitar.

Timothy Johnson, MD, received his A.B. with distinction and high honors and A.M. from the University of Michigan and M.D. from the University of Virginia. Dr. Johnson is the Bates

Professor of the Diseases of Women and Children and Chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Professor of Women's Studies, and Research Professor in the Center for Human Growth and Development at the University of Michigan. Since assuming this position in 1993, Dr. Johnson has initiated the Women's Health Program, University of Michigan Health System, which has received designation and funding by the US Department of Health and Human Services as a National Center of Excellence in Women's Health. He has worked to position the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology and the Women's Health Program at the University of Michigan in the top tier of academic, clinical and research programs as recognized by such measures as NIH and US News & WR rankings. The Michigan Initiative for Women's Health located at the Institute for Research on Women and Gender is a NIH-funded Building Interdisciplinary Research Careers in Women's Health (BIRCWH) site and the Department is a Specialized Center of Research (SCOR: Birth, muscle injury, and pelvic floor dysfunction). Dr. Johnson has served on numerous editorial boards, study sections, professional committees, societies and boards including the NIH Director's Advisory Committee on Women's Health and Research (ACWHR). He is an elected member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science. In 2005, Dr. Johnson was awarded the Distinguished Service Award, the highest honor of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. In 2007, he was appointed Editor of the International Journal of Gynecology and Obstetrics (IJGO). He is President-elect (2007-2008) of the Association of Professors of Gynecology and Obstetrics (APGO).

Dr. Johnson served residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Michigan, fellowship in Maternal-Fetal Medicine at The Johns Hopkins University and US Air Force Medical Corps duty from 1981 to 1985 at Keesler AFB, Mississippi and the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (Andrews AFB and Naval Hospital Bethesda, Maryland).

Dr. Johnson's academic career began at Johns Hopkins in 1985 where he established the Fetal Assessment Center focused on clinical and research aspects of maternal fetal physiology, fetal development, prenatal diagnosis and therapy. He subsequently became Residency Program Director and Director of the Division of Maternal Fetal Medicine at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. His scholarly contributions, including over 150 peer-review publications among others, reflect important work on assessment of fetal gestational age, evaluation of fetal well-being, and clinical aspects of fetal behavior. His research team has focused on fetal behavioral ontogeny and published seminal work on behavioral ontogeny, relationships between various fetal behavioral characteristics, and on fetal to neonatal transitional behaviors.

Dr. Johnson continues to mentor and advise graduate students in the area of fetal behavioral development, as well as those interested in international women's health. He regularly teaches University undergraduates as well as medical students and post-graduates on women's health, men's health, and transcultural and transnational issues in women's health. His class on

Women's Reproductive Health, in its tenth year at the University of Michigan, is one of the most popular undergraduate classes.

Since 1985, Dr. Johnson has been actively involved in women's health projects and sustainable partnerships in the developing world. He was one of the leaders of a group which established the Carnegie Corporation's American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG)/Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (UK) postgraduate training program in Ghana. This program, one of the most successful in Carnegie's history, has now trained over 35 obstetrician/gynecologists who have achieved specialist certification by the West African College of Surgeons where Dr. Johnson has received honorary fellowship. Former trainees of the program include the current Chairs of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Ghana Medical School and the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology in Kumasi, and a program graduate recently was named Minister of Health of Ghana. Dr. Johnson has continued the student, resident, and faculty exchange between Ghana universities and the United States and is working to extend this model to Nigeria, Malawi, and other parts of Africa. A former Chair of the ACOG Committee on International Affairs, Dr. Johnson was instrumental in the successful strategy to link ACOG with Central and South America professional bodies leading to improved educational and clinical programs and active collaboration among Western Hemisphere obstetrician/gynecologists.

Sandra Leiblum, PhD, is the director of sexual and relationship services at the New Jersey Center for Sexual Wellness and a clinical professor of clinical pharmacology at the University of Tennessee Health Science Center. She also conducts an active private practice for individuals and couples in Bridgewater, NJ. For 35 years, she was Director of the Center for Sexual and Relationship Health and a professor of psychiatry at UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in Piscataway, NJ.

Dr. Leiblum is a leader in the field of human sexuality and sex therapy. Under her direction, the Human Sexuality Program at her medical school provided thousands of medical students and residents with a foundation in sexual medicine during the annual "Sex Week Program." She is the editor of 11 books, including Principles and Practice of Sex Therapy, which is in its 4th edition and is arguably the gold standard for practitioners interested in learning current approaches to the treatment of sexual problems. She is also an active researcher with over 130 peer-reviewed articles related to male and female sexuality, sexual function assessment, menopause and infertility. She was the first to identify the syndrome of persistent genital arousal disorder and has conducted major research relating to this distressing problem.

Finally, Dr. Leiblum is the recipient of many honors and awards, including the Masters and Johnson Lifetime Achievement Award from the Society for Sex Therapy and Research, the Professional Standards of Excellence Award from the American Association of Sexuality

Educators, Counselors and Therapists and the Richard J. Cross Award for outstanding contributions to the field of sexuality education, among others.

Dennis P. Sugrue, PhD, is a clinical psychologist and Diplomate in sex therapy. He is a Clinical Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Michigan Medical School and has a private practice in Bloomfield Hills, MI. Previously, Dr. Sugrue was Associate Division Chief of Outpatient Psychiatry for the Henry Ford Health System. A recognized expert in human sexuality, Dr. Sugrue is listed in Who's Who in America and Who's Who in the World for his contributions to the field. He was the founder and former co-director of the Henry Ford Center for Human Sexuality. He lectures on sexual issues across the United States and at international conferences and is often quoted in the popular media including Ladies Home Journal, Parents' Magazine, Esquire, Cosmo, and Glamour. Dr. Sugrue is a past President of the American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors, and Therapists (AASECT), the nation's largest credentialing organization for professionals specializing in human sexuality. He has authored journal articles and textbook chapters, co-authored Sex Matters for Women (Guilford, 2002), hosted the Sex over Sixty DVD (Academy, 2007), and serves on the editorial board for the journal, Sexual Addiction and Compulsivity.

Bill Taverner, MA, is the director of The Center for Family Life Education at Planned Parenthood of Greater Northern New Jersey, and is the editor of the American Journal of Sexuality Education. He has co-authored many sex education teaching resources, including Sex Ed 101, Making Sense of Abstinence, and Taking Sides: Clashing Views in Human Sexuality. Mr. Taverner has received national awards recognizing his leadership in sexuality education, including the "AASECT Founder's Award," given by the American Association of Sexuality Educators, Counselors, and Therapists, the "Golden Apple Award," given by the Association for Planned Parenthood Leaders in Education, and he was named "one of the country's pre-eminent sex educators, trainers, sex education theorists." (Sexual Intelligence, 2006).

Beverly Whipple, PhD, a certified sexuality educator, sexuality counselor, and sex researcher, is the co author of the international best seller, The G Spot and Other Discoveries about Human Sexuality, which has been translated into 19 languages and was re-published as a Classic 23 years later in 2005. Her other co-authored books are Safe Encounters: How Women can say Yes to Pleasure and No to Unsafe Sex, Smart Women, Strong Bones, Outwitting Osteoporosis, The Science of Orgasm, and The Orgasm Answer Guide (2009, in press: Johns Hopkins Univ. press). Dr. Whipple has appeared on over 250 radio and TV programs and has been featured in many magazines. She has delivered over 600 talks and keynote speeches, published over 160 research articles and book chapters. In 1982 and 1983 The Philadelphia Magazine named her one of the People to Watch. She is the recipient of many awards, including the Hugo Beigel Research Award for research excellence and the best article published in the Journal of Sex Research, the NJ State Nurses' Association Award for Excellence in Research,

the Distinguished Scientific Achievement Award, the Public Service Award, the Kinsey Award and the Bullough Award for the most distinguished book written in 2006 from the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality (SSSS), and the Professional Standard of Excellence Award and the Distinguished Service Award from the American Association of Sexuality Educators, Counselors and Therapists (AASECT). She is also a Fellow of the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality and a Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing. The New Scientist has named her one of the 50 most influential scientists in the world (2006).

Dr. Whipple is a Professor Emerita at Rutgers University of NJ. She has a BS in Nursing from Wagner College, a Masters in Counseling, a Masters in Nursing, and a PhD in Psychobiology, with a major in Neurophysiology, from Rutgers University.

Her concern with women's health derives naturally from her over forty years of helping women to feel better about themselves, as a nurse, a nurse educator, and researcher. Her research focuses mainly on women's health issues and the sexual physiology of women.

Dr. Whipple is a member of a number of Honor Societies and received the Alumni Achievement Award in 1983 and was named An Alumni Fellow in 2007 by Wagner College. Dr. Whipple was the President of AASECT (1998-2000), was the Vice President of the World Association for Sexology (2001-2005), was on the Board of the International Society for the Study of Women's Sexual Health (2002-2004), was the President of SSSS (2002-2003), is now the Secretary General of the World Association for Sexual Health (WAS) (2005-2009) and is on the Board of the Foundation for the Scientific Study of Sexuality (FSSS).

Dr. Whipple lives in Voorhees, New Jersey with Jim, her husband since 1962. They have two grown children and five grandchildren.
